- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather
- than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential

DIALOGUE PARTICIPANTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



GROUND RULES

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others

Training & education: respect starts with the family; trust

Graffiti is never cleaned up – in some areas, the community has objected to police assigned to work trash pickup.

Shopping carts are taken a lot by the Homeless ; homeless don't want to be off the street ; after encampments are cleanup, they come back; 70-80% are M.I.

2% of the homeless are truly homeless, the rest are transients.

Environmental issues impact homeless encampments.

communication is necessary for a good relationship. Transparency is needed on BOTH ENDS – two-way








Yes 92%


