- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space



### DIALOGUE PARTICIPANTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



#### **GROUND RULES**

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others







HAVE YOUR OPINIONS CHANGED AS A RESULT OF THIS DIALOGUE?









# IS LAW ENFORCEMENT ADEQUATELY ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY?










## WHAT, IF ANY, ACTION(S) DO YOU EXPECT TO TAKE AS A RESULT OF THIS DIALOGUE?

- Invite more youth and young people to participate in these types of programs





Adding more small businesses is good for the community.


Open more businesses & hiring members of the community helps with overall improvement.

Appearance/ dress means a lot in the message it sends










In order to DE-ESCALATE misinterpreted actions

Internal problems are adding to officers' accountability.

When stopping citizens, the police need to tell the members of the community what to expect.





Parents need to be held accountable.

It takes from day one of the child's life to teach them to be respectful to adults, which in turn, will help with the little everyday things.

Some moms & dads can't teach their kids because they weren't raised themselves by their parents; kids loathe their parents in elementary; in middle & high school we lose them...





In a community of color, the political power is limited by the amount of people in custody; if they are out and participating in the community, than more people can change the community





The smaller groups were quite impactful: very rich conversations with an amazing group of people who are very active; they want to be even more proactive after this...







Participant: Police are not part of & don't know the community they are patrolling...

Police: Officers don't need to live in the community to be a part of it; by patrolling it everyday, you spend more time "knowing" the streets (even more so than in your own).

Participant: you may "know" the streets but do you "know" the people?

Police are no longer on a beat – walking – which leads to familiarity with the neighborhood. They need to get out of their cars and talk to people; the police need to make the first move and they need to form relations with kids in particular.



Police are taught objective reasonableness to ascertain use of force.


People in the community see police as groups; bad officers cause people not to see the good officers.



The greatest need is to reach out to the youth directly by going into the classrooms or to Sunday school

Police need to be sure to exhaust all tactical limits prior to using lethal force.

We need to take this to the top, and bring it down & spread it out. This needs to be taken to the whole community.



DoD with youth & parent participation. Bring this to the middle schools or younger so we get to them before they become volatile.






The procedural aspect of what is going on is unknown to the public, but they want to understand the process.
