














IS LAW ENFORCEMENT ADEQUATELY ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY?










Building rapport between police and community

One youth said: "I hate officers, they give no respect"






Fear is a two - way street; help others open their eyes to see how some police try to help and while others do not.


The importance of noticing behind the uniform is also a human 2-way street

(Too) many mistakes happen with racial profiling






Media only talks about bad things to push the ratings. Social media only focuses on negative issues.




HAVE YOUR OPINIONS CHANGED AS A RESULT OF THIS DIALOGUE?













