- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



GROUND RULES

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others





PRE-DIALOGUE SURVEY RESULTS

153 Survey Respondents





GENDER Male **Female** 49% 51% DAYSOF DIALOGUE OTHE FUTURE OF POLICING

























IS LAW ENFORCEMENT ADEQUATELY ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY?



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
OTHER ACTIONS:

Learning & educating through more dialoguing



People need more help in the community.

The Civilian Police Academy (CPAC) is an 8-10 week event for the community to experience a part of police training.

Perhaps CCC can support in their facilities, the available community/citizen trainings on how to react to the police.

Need program training: shoot or not shoot scenarios to be taken by citizens. Let the community see the scenarios & role playing. This can help change the perception of officers.

LAPD is going into high schools & college to inform about the laws.



Have town hall meetings to showcase the police and the training of the community.

Community & Police need to listen to each other and put themselves in each other's shoes; community needs to meet the police half-way.

Bring back the beat police officers. There are mixed messages between the police and the public.

Lean about the responsibilities of the police and the citizens.











Request that the police admit it when a bad shooting occurs.

Why does it take so long to tell the facts after an incident?

Deaf people are getting shot in the back; you can't shoot a person walking away.

Is there a psych eval for officers? They should occur annually and be publicized. Police need more "mental health" support.

They need to be trained to put their personal issues aside when interacting with the community.

File a report against an officer if they are disrespectful, because many officers are doing great jobs and they also suffer from the bad apples.


There needs to be a separate prosecutorial system for police misconduct, because nothing happens to them.

"Why do you shoot to kill?"

We are trained to stop a deadly threat. We are trained to target the center body mass. After firing twice, we have to assess before firing again. You can't put your finger on the trigger unless you intend to shoot.

It is hard to take someone into custody when they don't want to go. You have to have thick skin.









We should educate the youth about cameras and how to stand up calmly for their rights.

Youth should stay calm and be respectful as best they can for their own protection and to deescalate the situation.

Education is needed on both sides.

Need to have things for the kids to do to keep them off the streets.

Education of the youth is the root issue. We need the community's help to teach the art of communication.

And have policeman in the classrooms.





Parents have a concern with how their children progress and engage with their teachers.

Set up or restore After school programs, such as DARE or ROTC.

Have career days where police, firefighters, etc. brief kids to show positive sides of their work.

Parents are afraid of their children because of improper discipline; therefore, the youth disrespect police officers.





Many blacks feel they are fighting a fight they cannot win.

Do you think disrespect for the police is generational?



COMMUNITY QUESTIONS / OFFICER RESPONSES

- On TV, the police are always pulling their guns; does that really happen?
 - No
- Do you have to knock them down to the ground?
 - No, this usually occurs when they don't comply
- What are the rules about carrying a gun?
 - Gun has to be kept in a locked glove compartment or in the trunk, not in the car's driver or passenger spaces.
- Could a tazer stop my heart?
 - It is a possibility

- Will a tazer stop a criminal in their tracks?
 - Depends if they are on drugs or mentally ill
- Does the 77th keep the white officers as partners?
 - No
- Are officers trained to handle individuals they encounter with mental concerns?
 - All officers get "mental" training; it is called "MHIT"
- The real issue is excessive force; it is always being used on us.
 - I agree, Maybe we need a session the the Command Staff...



There is the black culture, There is the Latino culture. And than, there is the gang culture. And all within the same neighborhood. It is crucial to understand each one of them.

Culture is a factor in the interactions with the police.

Cultural divide is great, need more diversity.

Councilman Price has designated \$1 million to s u p p o r t i n g t h e undocumented receiving legal services, but others in the community are upset by the funding and concerned about how it will take away from the citizens of L.A.






Do you have to knock them down to the ground? Why do you let a pursuit go on for so long?

Priority calls: Who gets help first?






Media feeds the fire and doesn't support a good relationship between the police and the community. It needs to change, to see more good things.

The government does not distinguish between people; for them all Latinos are Mexican.

Some of us come from different communities / countries where the police don't enforce the laws, are not paid well and do a different job from the police here.

LAPD does not enforce the immigration laws.







I try to form my opinion from my own experiences instead of from the news or social media.

I know we can do better. I will do my best to influence kids & adults to a more positive view & actions on the part of the LAPD.

Communities are hard working in general.

77th needs to communicate better: update the website, send out emails about events, answer the phones better & publicly put out more information to avoid rioting & outbreaks.

There needs to be more funding for training..

LAPD is implementing more "reality based" training.

I am 83 years old and I have always treated officers with respect and they have treated me with respect.

This has opened my eyes to see the other side of the incidents the police have daily. The discussion has given me more substance to think about

Body cameras are good, but when the police go into a home, it is an invasion of privacy. The cameras are good to review stops but are less flexible in letting people off with a warning.





Need to fix the war on poverty in order to have Community Policing, which helps people meet each other where they live and build relationships,








We need to have more accountability in the legal system.


We cannot have the same district attorney that is dependent on police for their cases, to also protect those same police. We need a totally different office to handle police officers that need to be prosecuted.

The accuracy of the information to officers responding to a call will determine how they handle the situation once they arrive on scene.
