DAYS OF DIALOGUE IS... FACILITATED DIALOGUE

- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space



DIALOGUE PARTICIPANTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



GROUND RULES

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others







PRE-DIALOGUE SURVEY RESULTS






IS LAW ENFORCEMENT ADEQUATELY ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY?

- Promote knowledge sharing between law enforcement, social workers and advocates.





I hope it is not the last time we see each other and I hope to continue the conversation very soon.




I am so thankful to all the youth that showed up today; I thought no way they would come.



Thank you for the opportunity for dialogue.










It is obvious to me that the officers need to have their feelings heard and held as important. I hope this happens citywide.
