- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space



### DIALOGUE PARTICIPANTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



#### **GROUND RULES**

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others







## PRE-DIALOGUE SURVEY RESULTS












#### **IS LAW ENFORCEMENT ADEQUATELY ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY?**




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## WHAT, IF ANY, ACTION(S) DO YOU EXPECT TO TAKE AS A RESULT OF THIS DIALOGUE?







This is a great thing – we have LASD and LAPD here together to listen to the concerns and needs of the community and to share our experiences & perspectives.



Why are the police officers shooting at black people if they don't have any weapons?



When young African American males get stopped, they are looked at as a threat and that's why they get killed, and not necessarily because of what they were doing.

It's not a problem if someone is a criminal and they get shot. The concern is that when people aren't doing anything wrong and they still get killed.

In some situations, when someone is pulled over because they look suspicious for some reason, any reason - they just never know...

the police or the driver







Legacy of slaves- still living with it.
Every person of color has been "jacked" by the police and has seen other people of color also get "jacked"... all the time.

Sheriff says:
Before, I hated the sheriffs and how they treated black people.
We need good black men in the police department.

My son looks at the news on the TV and he says he feels like an endangered species.

There is much concern about African American males being treated differently.

Regarding racial profiling, some young black males are seen as a threat even when they are not doing anything wrong.

Actually, this has raised my awareness to the fact that things have not changed much at all. It changed my mood to sad.

Such a long way yet to go.





Mental health is also a big concern, for so many different reasons.


Not enough services for the mentally ill but also not enough people trained to help or detect mental illness.






You usually don't know until afterwards, until after something bad happens, and than those individuals are even more rejected and farther away from any chance of getting the necessary help.
