DAYS OF DIALOGUE IS... FACILITATED DIALOGUE

- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space



DIALOGUE PARTICIPANTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



GROUND RULES

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others





ETHNICITY










ARE YOU IN CHARGE OF YOUR LIFE?












HAVE YOUR OPINIONS CHANGED AS A RESULT OF THIS DIALOGUE?




You have to know the background.
Police are trying to work in

with us, then they won't just come in
and arrest us.

Sometimes the police come in and do good things.

Basically, they explained their tactics- get a call- somebody's on the run.

Even some of the cops- they get pressured by other cops like we get pressured, stopped when they are off duty.







Probation officer saying:

"Asked a kid what he was in here for. Told our group the original charge- I was actually pulled over for that. I don't know why- I didn't get arrested.

Cops aren't always out to get you.
I got pulled over for vandalism. I got taken home, and got a beating, but I didn't get arrested.

The cop let me go. I don't know why.

The cops are not always trying to get you."



We went around the room and asked each other to describe us. Who were you raised by? What did they teach us in life?






You don't always have to do a crime- don't always have to be doing something that you aren't supposed to be doing. You can get a job and take care of yourself.


I want to thank the police officers who came here today to talk to us. You put us here in jail, but it felt like you cared about us.

Consensual encounter- can I talk to you? Officer speaks to you, doesn't ask for ID. You are free to leave.

Legal detention- you cannot leave.
