### DAYS OF DIALOGUE IS... FACILITATED DIALOGUE

- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space



### DIALOGUE PARTICIPANTS ARE ENCOURAGED TO...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



#### **GROUND RULES**

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Keep comments brief and stay focused on task
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones
- Be respectful of the opinions of others






### GENDER






### **ETHNICITY**






### **AGE**








## IS LAW ENFORCEMENT ADEQUATELY ADDRESSING THE CONCERNS OF THE COMMUNITY? Completely Not at all

















Lots of bias is expressed on social media.

Social media: what we read may not be true. Think before you re-post.

Parts of the story may not be true, or there may be a whole new story.


Social media does give people a voice.
But sometimes, it gives people someone else's voice.

Officers go through different types of training, all kinds of scenarios.

Training to determine if someone may or may not have a mental illness.


Officers do make an effort to understand if people have mental illness.

There is an LGBTQ division in LAPD for reporting hate crimes.





YOUTH WORKSHOPS









We need to build a better bridge of understanding between officers and people.

We discussed gun violence. The culture is responding to incidents out in the world.

Police officers have to second guess themselves when they pull someone over. They don't want to get hurt themselves, but they can't let that effect how they deal with the person.





40% of homeless youth are LGBTQ. Possibly kicked out of their homes.

Voiced that those using "survival sex" for money should be helped, not arrested.

Law allows people to go to the bathroom of the sex they identify with.

LAPD: "I have a trans friend. She is so much fun to hang out with!"

There is the HOPE Team. Developed by LAPD Homeless Coordinator. Goal is to get to know the people on the streets, and their situations.

Police need/get regular training + refreshers. Look at the environment. Is there a gender issue? Nonbinary? Signs of mental illness or other issues?

Missing persons case- orientation adds necessary layers to identify and address.

What is the anatomy for a search?





Different cultures in this country. People in the south have a different attitude towards authority.

In certain places, people may care more about their communities than in other places.

Have to be able to see and understand all sides. Social media complicates our ability to do this.

LAPD receives implicit bias training.

We talked about mental illness, the homeless, homeless youth.
