

Days of Dialogue is... Facilitated dialogue

- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space

Dialogue participants are encouraged to...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other



48 PARTICIPANTS

32 students (6th, 7th, 8th Grade) - 18 girls, 15 boys

8 LAPD officers

1 Teacher, 3 Administrators

4 Facilitators

Dialogue Format

Synergy Kinetic Academy-Middle School Leadership Class students experienced their first Day of Dialogue, with the topic "Gun Violence Prevention." Students were encouraged to share their honest opinions + describe their lived experiences on the topic of gun violence and gun violence prevention. After a brief introduction to the program, the class was divided into four smaller groups. Each group consisted of several students, 1 facilitator, and 2 LAPD officers.

The young people had the opportunity to interact with LAPD officers in a safe space, with a neutral facilitator to guide the dialogue process. Participants explored both the prepared questions, and they were able to ask their own questions as well. The discussion is meant to be organic.

For both the youth and the officers, we have found that this format works to transform relationships—sometimes even in just a single dialogue session.

DAYS OF DIALOGUE on GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION GROUND RULES for DIALOGUE

Ground Rules:

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones (unless the group agrees otherwise)
- Be respectful of the opinions of others

- 1- What is your name, organization affiliation, if any?
- 2- What are your expectations of today's dialogue?

Part 2: Critical Questions

- 1- What did you learn about guns growing up?
- 2- What guidance, if any, was given to you about how guns should be handled when you were growing up?
- 3- What has been the most valuable guidance you received related to guns as a child, teen or adult?
- 4- What has been the most direct impact of gun violence on you or people that you know?
- 5- If you or someone you know were ever asked to "hold" a gun for someone else- maybe someone who is older- how would you feel about that? What would you do?

VIDEO GAMES and SOCIAL MEDIA

- 5- How have video games impacted your impression of guns and gun violence?
- 6- How has social media impacted your impression of guns and gun violence?
- 7- Were you ever bullied on social media? If so, what did you do?
- 8- Is the content of video games harmful? helpful? neither? both? Please discuss.
- 9- How have video games impacted your impression of police officers?
- 10- How has social media impacted your impression of police officers?

IN GENERAL

- 11- What is your overall impression of police officers in your community? Please discuss both positive and negative aspects.
- 12- What might police officers do to gain your trust?



COMMENTS


- If you find a gun on the floor, what do you do?







Q3 What is your age?









Q8 If you answered Yes, Frequently, or Sometimes, do you believe that law enforcement officers can change their behavior to consistently treat people pf color fairly?




POST Survey Gun Violence Prevention with Synergy Middle School 11-14-2019


Q2 Is law enforcement able to help you manage conflicts you may be experiencing in your community?



Q3 When comparing treatment of community members by law enforcement, do you believe that people of color are consistently treated less fairly by law enforcement officers than are white people?








Q4 If you answered Yes, Frequently or Sometimes, do you believe that law enforcement officers can change their behavior to consistently treat people of color fairly?




PRE If you answered Yes, Frequently, or Sometimes, do you believe that law enforcement officers can change their behavior to consistently treat people pf color fairly?


