



Days of Dialogue is... Facilitated dialogue

- Structured Conversation
- The facilitator acts as a moderator, rather than a leader and is always neutral
- The purpose is to share Thoughts, Feelings, and Experiences in a safe and confidential space

Dialogue participants are encouraged to...

- Express your opinions
- Listen to others
- Give everyone a chance to speak
- Respect the ground rules
- Respect each other

25 students - 23 girls, 2 boys

5 LAPD officers

2 Teachers, 2 Administrators

1 Charter School executive

4 Facilitators, 1 INVLA staff

Dialogue Format

Synergy Kinetic Academy-Middle School Service Learning Class students experienced their first Day of Dialogue, with the topic "Gun Violence Prevention." Students were encouraged to share their honest opinions + describe their lived experiences with regard to law enforcement, gun violence, and other topics. Students in this class are delving into the impact of housing insecurity in their community. The students were able to ask questions about how these stressors might impact police officers' work on a daily basis. After a brief introduction to the program, the class was divided into four smaller groups. Each group consisted of several students, 1 facilitator, and 1 or 2 LAPD officers.

The young people had the opportunity to interact with LAPD officers in a safe space, with a neutral facilitator to guide the dialogue process. Participants explored both the prepared questions, as well as their own ideas and concerns. The discussion is meant to be organic. For both the youth and the officers, we have found that this format works to transform relationships- sometimes even in just a single dialogue session.

DAYS OF DIALOGUE on GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION GROUND RULES for DIALOGUE

Ground Rules:

- Speak openly and honestly
- Listen carefully and respectfully to each person
- Explore differences respectfully and look for common ground
- Trust that the facilitator has the best interest of the group at heart
- Silence cell phones (unless the group agrees otherwise)
- Be respectful of the opinions of others








Q2 What is your ethnicity? Check all that apply.



Q5 Are you in charge of your life?








Q7 When comparing treatment of community members by law enforcement, do you believe that people of color are consistently treated less fairly by law enforcement officers than are white people?



Q8 If you answered Yes, Frequently, or Sometimes, do you believe that law enforcement officers can change their behavior to consistently treat people pf color fairly?








Q2 Is law enforcement able to help you manage conflicts you may be experiencing in your community?








Q3 When comparing treatment of community members by law enforcement, do you believe that people of color are consistently treated less fairly by law enforcement officers than are white people?




PRE When comparing treatment of community members by law enforcement, do you believe that people of color are consistently treated less fairly by law enforcement officers than are white people?







Q4 If you answered Yes, Frequently or Sometimes, do you believe that law enforcement officers can change their behavior to consistently treat people of color fairly?





Q5 What are the most important areas that you would like to discuss further? (Check all that apply)





• We talked about:

We talked about why the police came here today- they wanted to make friends (and eat tamales) Reasons for housing insecurity and homelessness: We learned about Rent and Red Lines. 
